Now in its fifth year, Lunch and Learn continues its investigation of Halakha, or the tradition of Jewish law.

Over the past few years, a variety of topics have been investigated: holiday observance and perspectives on Shabbat, divorce, suicide, death and mourning, purity and impurity, kitniyot, the giving of tzedaka.

This spring, starting January 18th, we will focus on the intersection of kashrut (kosher dietary laws) and ethics, with an emphasis on animal welfare. We will also explore related issues as they arise according to participants' interests.

During Rabbi Ben Weiner's sabbatical, Lunch and Learn will be led by Rabbi David Seidenberg. Rabbi Seidenberg has been a frequent teacher in the JCA community and is the author of *Kabbalah and Ecology: God's Image in the More-Than-Human World*. He also leads the Prayground Minyan based in Northampton.


Talmud Peer-Reading Group

Henia Lewin is a recipient of the prestigious Covenant Award as an Outstanding Jewish Educator in North America. She graduated from the Jewish Teachers' Seminary as Yiddish Valedictorian, and earned an M.Ed. from the University of Vermont where she became an instructor of Hebrew and Yiddish and director of Hillel. During a sabbatical she taught Hebrew in Jerusalem to

new immigrants from the Former Soviet Union. Henia was born in Lithuania and survived the Holocaust as a hidden child.

The course and outcome of the 2016 Presidential campaign have important implications for the relationship between the United States and Israel, the future of democracy in both countries, and the growing divide between Jews in Israel and in North America. Join us for a discussion of these timely issues with Jesse Ferris, Vice President of the Israel Democracy Institute.



Dr. Jesse Ferris is Vice President of Strategy at the Israel Democracy Institute in Jerusalem. He holds a B.A. in History from Yale University and a Ph.D. in Middle Eastern Studies from Princeton University. His first book, *Nasser's Gamble: How Intervention in Yemen Caused the Six-Day War and the Decline of Egyptian Power*, was published in 2012 by Princeton University Press.

The internet has transformed many of the traditional structures of Jewish life and has been the inspiration for many new ones. In this three-session class, Jody Rosenbloom will be our guide through thought-provoking blogs, websites, and other social media aimed at the evolving Jewish community. The class will examine sites for Torah study, hevruta/study partners, life cycle rituals, on-line yarzeit minyans, social action, cultural resources and more. Together we will discuss our reactions, concerns and insights as to the application of these tools for community building and explore how we would define Jewish community and identity in light of new trends.



Jody Rosenbloom, M.A., retired in June 2015 as Director of Lifelong Learning after her 18th year serving the Jewish Community of Amherst. Her Jewish education and professional development span Conservative, Reform and Reconstructionist movements. She has taught and administered programming across all age levels, in both formal and informal settings, including two years as a field instructor for Delet (Master of Arts in

teaching with specialty in Jewish day school) interns through Brandeis University. She is currently on the board of the Lander-Grinspoon Academy, the advisory committee for the Jewish Film Festival of the Pioneer Valley, and the Friends of Forbes Library garden tour committee.

Basics of Hebrew Calligraphy

Participants will learn "how to learn" any new font by carefully understanding how *one* font works. The letters are taught incrementally through their parts, starting with *Yod*, *Vuv*, *Resh*, and so forth and ending with the two fabulous non-conformists: *Tzadi* and *Alef*.



We will practice precision, centering, patience, focus, and breathing. With each beautiful deliberate black stroke, we will feel the relation of one letter to the other and learn to appreciate the white spaces we create. Additionally, you will hear a bit about the mystical meanings of the letters. If you weren't familiar with the Hebrew alphabet, you will be now!

Jane Trigère is an artist who occasionally teaches calligraphy and embroidery and uses both in her art. She has a B.F.A. from Boston University School of Fine Arts. She was an art bookbinder for many years and then in her 50's studied for an M.A. in Jewish Art from Jewish Theological Seminary. For this, and many other blessings, she is very grateful.

Israel and Palestine: a Clash of Nationalisms

Professor Aaron Berman

POSTPONED UNTIL FALL 2017

The purpose of this course is to understand the historical background that the mass media never discusses when reporting on the conflict between Palestinians and Israelis. We will examine the history of Zionism and Palestinian nationalism. First we will study the origins of each nationalism. We will then examine the critical moments in the long history of conflict between these two nationalisms. These will include: World War I; the Jewish refugee crisis of the 1930s; the Palestinian revolt of 1936; World War II and the Holocaust; the partition of Palestine in 1947 and the establishment of Israel in 1948; the Palestinian exile and the creation of the refugee crisis; and the 1967 Six Day War and its aftermath. We will end with a discussion of recent events and proposed solutions to the clash.



Aaron Berman is Professor of History at Hampshire College. He has taught courses on the history of Zionism and Palestinian nationalism for many years. His publications include *Nazism*, the Jews and American Zionism: 1933-1948. He is currently writing a book tentatively titled, First Encounters: The United States and Arab Nationalism 1908-1933.

Passover Preparation: a Workshop Based on Joanna Macy's Work That Reconnects

Joanna Macy's *Work That Reconnects* draws from deep ecology, systems theory and spiritual traditions. It builds motivation, creativity, courage and solidarity for the transition to a regenerative human culture.

This 4-hour workshop will serve as an introduction to the basic concepts of *WTR*, a *kehila* (community) for those who practice the *WTR*, and a collective process of spiritual preparation for Passover. We will experience successive practices to explore themes of oppression and liberation among our human and ecological worlds.

Wear clothing that is comfortable to move around in. Weather permitting, we will spend part of the time outdoors.

Cara Michelle Silverberg directs youth and teen programs at the JCA. In 2014, she participated in the Earth Leadership Cohort program, training directly with Joanna Macy. Cara is passionate about facilitating transformative learning experiences that allow people to explore and express themselves, their relationships with the earth, and their relationships with each other.

Joanna Macy is a scholar of Buddhism, systems theory and deep ecology, and a respected voice in the movements for peace, justice, and environmentalism. Joanna is the root teacher of the *Work That Reconnects*, and is known worldwide for empowering activists in social and ecological justice. (Note: Joanna will not be present at this workshop.)

Counting the Omer: How Does Your Garden Grow?

This Lunch and Learn program will focus on the period of the Omer - a time of preparation. During the seven weeks of the Omer, we are headed towards Shavuot, a festival that, biblically, is about giving. We also understand Shavuot as the commemoration of the receiving of the Torah at Sinai. Either way, we have to prepare, we have to fertilize our garden.

Over these seven weeks, we will explore the Omer from the basics of the mitzvah of counting each day to developing our own personal practices for the spiritual journey through the sefirot.

We will start each session with a short period of quiet meditation, followed by a niggun. The rest of the time will be spent studying texts, discussing the Kabballistic attributes, and discussing our personal practices as they develop.



Diana Brewer has been a professional singer and instrumentalist for more than twenty years. Several years ago, she was moved to put her musical skills to work in the realm of Jewish spirituality. She is currently a third-year cantorial student in the Aleph Ordination Program. She serves as High Holy Days Hazzan at the JCA, and has been co-leader of the monthly Shabbat Ne'imah services since their inception.
